Join Us for Our "Four Weeks of Famous Families" Lecture Series

How much do you really know about the settlers of Hamburg Township? Can you name the first five to purchase land here? Or explain the impact of the Grisson brothers who – besides suggesting the name of the township – also had a hand in local government, business, and agriculture? What about the family that's responsible for the most connections (through marriage) in the area? And, though you may have heard about Governor Edwin Winans, what do you know about the careers of his children? Well, all of these questions and more will be answered throughout the month of August in a new lecture series called "Four Weeks of Famous Families."

The first talk, focused on the Grissons, will be a Zoom presentation because the speaker – scholar Leon Ruterbories – lives in Germany. The next three lectures will all be live at the museum and will focus on the DeWolfs, the Halls, and the Winans.
